Fruit type	Variety	Comments
Apples	Anders Apple	Medium to large. Greenish-yellow base overlaid with generous red striping. Crisp, white flesh is sweet with some tang, flavorful. Excellent all-purpose fruit. When green, reminds you of Granny Smith. More ripe, reminds you of a Fuji apple. [LE Cooke description] Said to be codling moth resistant (?).
	Braeburn Apple	Late season, crisp and tangy, similar to Granny Smith but richer flavor. Excellent keeper. Green with dark red blush. October-November harvest. Self-fruitful.
	Fuji Apple	Sweet, crisp and flavorful, excellent keeper. Late September. Excellent pollenizer for other apple varieties. Self-fruitful.
	Granny Smith Apple	Bright green skin, tart/sweet flavor, great texture. For eating, cooking, sauce. October - November harvest.
	Honeycrisp Apple	Scarlet red over yellow background. Sweet/tart flavor. "Texture like a crisp watermelon or Asian pear, explosively crisp, fun to eat and very juicy. Keeps very well. Consistent production. Fruit very large. Ripens September." [LEC] Pollenize with any other apple.
Apricots	Blenheim (Royal) Apricot	The standard, with delicious juicy fruit. Very early in this area--late May - June.
	Harcot Apricot	Excellent flavor and quality. Large, sweet, juicy, rich flavor. Brown rot resistant. Mid-June.
	Royal Apricot	Old standard variety, with delicious juicy fruit. Very early in this area--late May - June.
Berries	Boysenberry, thornless	Very large fruit, very productive. Reddish-black fruit. Sweet and tart all-purpose berries. June.
	Loganberry, thornless	Lighter red and tangier than Boysen, otherwise very similar. Excellent variety. June.
	Marion Berry	Firm fruit holds its shape in cooking. Blackberry class. Rich flavor. June.
	Olallie Berry	Black, shiny berries with wild blackberry flavor. Very productive. Blackberry class. Late May.
	Triple Crown berry	Large fruit, excellent flavor. Blackberry class. Late producer extends season into July.
	Youngberry, thornless	Similar to Boysenberries but somewhat sweeter. June.
	Heritage Raspberry	A reliable, somewhat heat-tolerant variety of red raspberry. Everbearing (each cane produces a fall crop in first year, early summer crop in second year).
Figs	Black Mission Fig	Purplish-black skin, pink flesh, rich flavor. Heavy bearing large tree with 2 crops per year. Fresh or dry.
	Blackjack Fig	Natural dwarf tree, easily kept under 10'. Fruit like Black Mission. 2 crops per year.
	Brown Turkey Fig	Brown skin, pink flesh. Sweet, rich flavor, used fresh. 2 crops per year. Widely adapted. Small tree, 15' or so. 2 crops per year.
	Kadota Fig	White fruit (greenish-yellow) is firm-textured, good for processing, very sweet. 2 crops per year. Large, beautiful tree, can be kept smaller by pruning. 2 crops per year.
	White Genoa Fig	Greenish-white skin, pink flesh, very juicy and sweet. 2 crops per year.
Grapes, table	Black Monukka Grape	Seedless black table grape, very sweet with crisp texture. August - September.
	Eastern Concord Grape	Blue black grapes with strong, rich flavor. Popular for juice, jelly. The classic grape juice variety! Attractive foliage; nice for arbors. August - September.
	Eastern Concord Seedless Grape	Blue black seedless grapes with strong, rich flavor. Popular for juice, jelly. Attractive foliage; nice for arbors. August - September.
	Flame Seedless Grape	Very vigorous, productive red seedless grape with good flavor and texture. Ripens August - September
	Summer Muscat Grape	Seedless muscat hybrid grown for fresh eating, juice, DOV (dry-on-vine) raisins, or even dessert wines. August - September.
	Summer Royal Grape	Seedless black table grape. Late August.
	Thompson Seedless Grape	The seedless grape everyone knows. Easy to grow. Thin the clusters for larger fruit. Early August.

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Grapes, wine	Chardonnay Grape	In hot climates, Chardonnay produces strong, rich-flavored grapes with lots of sugar.
	Merlot Grape	Large clusters of soft, juicy grapes. Ripen early. Higher sugar content than Cabernet, lower than Zinfandel. Medium body. Often used for blending in Bordeaux-style wines.
	Shiraz Grape	AKA Syrah (but not the same as Petite Sirah!). Generally a very strong-flavored but less tannic red wine grape. Often used for blending.
	Zinfandel Grape	Planted in California since the 1850's. Very high sugar content, suitable for fresh eating or to dry as raisins.
Jujube	GA 866 Jujube (Chinese date)	Pretty little tree with shiny foliage. Very tough, easy to grow. Produces loads of fruit that look like little elongated brown apples. This variety has very high sugar content, delicious fresh off the tree. Sweet as dates when dried. Fall ripening.
Mulberries	Black Beauty Russian Mulberry	Fruit look like juicy blackberries, but all sweet not tart. Harvest in early summer for over a month. Birds love them. Naturally dwarf, slow-growing. Seeds are sterile.
	Teas Weeping Mulberry	Sweet, juicy fruit in early summer. Birds love them. Tree makes a striking accent, or playhouse for young kids.
Nectarines	Arctic Fantasy Nectarine	Great new white-flesh nectarine. Large rich-flavored red fruit. Early August.
	Fantasia Nectarine	Bright red skin, firm fleshed fruit. One of the best. Mid - late July.
	Flavortop Nectarine	Excellent fruit, firm texture; showy flowers. Early to Mid-July.
	Goldmine Nectarine	Large, attractive juicy fruit with white flesh and rich, sweet flavor. Early August.
	Independence Nectarine	Bright red skin, firm flesh, excellent flavor. One of the best. Late June.
	Ruby Grand Nectarine	Large fruit, yellow skin with red blush. Firm, melting flesh. Excellent! Taste test winner. Late June to early July.
Peaches	Champagne Peach	Medium-large light red fruit with white flesh. Melting texture. Good balance of sweet and tangy flavor. A gourmet peach! Mid-August.
	Early Elberta Peach	(aka Kim and July Elberta). Elbertas have yellow skin tinged with red. Very rich, distinctive flavor. Good all-purpose peaches; the ones you grew up with. Early July.
	Fay (Late) Elberta Peach	(aka Late Elberta) Heavy production of outstanding Elberta peaches on this late variant. Very rich, distinctive flavor; good all-purpose peach. Early August.
	Gleason Elberta Peach	(aka Improved Elberta and Lemon Elberta) Another excellent variant of Elberta, ripens in early July.
	Golden Glory Miniature Peach	Miniature tree with beautiful pink flowers and juicy fruit with good flavor. Very large, yellow-fleshed fruit. Mid to late August.
	June Gold Peach	Large fruit with rich flavor, melting texture. Cling. Prolific. Late May to early June.
	Loring Peach	Showy flowers, large fruit, very productive, great texture, top-rated flavor! Highly recommended! Mid-July.
	O'Henry Peach	Large showy flowers. Very productive, firm texture, very good quality fruit. Excellent all-purpose peach. Late August.
	Red Baron Peach	Stunning double red blooms--the showiest of all. Wonderful landscape tree. Very good sweet, juicy fruit. Mid-July to early August.
	Rio Oso Gem Peach	Very large fruit with firm texture and excellent flavor, on a naturally small tree. The best late variety. Mid-August.
	Summerset Peach	Late season yellow freestone. Large, sweet and flavorful. Good all-purpose fruit. Ripens early Sept.
Pears, Asian	Shinko Pear	Medium - large brownish fruit. Very rich, sweet with good texture. One of the best. August - mid-September.
	Shinseiki Pear	Medium size yellow, juicy fruit with mild flavor. Self-fruitful. Late July - mid-August.
Pears, European	Moonglow Pear	Large brownish fruit like Bartlett. Soft flesh, little grit. Very fireblight resistant. Early August.

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Persimmons	Fuyu Persimmon	Medium size flattened red-orange fruit can be eaten while still firm. Non-astringent. November. A mature Fuyu can produce 500 or more fruit! Jiro is the form of Fuyu most common in California.
	Hachiya Persimmon	Very large oblong red-orange fruit (has a short point) with very rich flavor. The best for cooking. Astringent until fully ripe; must be squishy soft before you can eat it. December.
Plums	Burgundy Plum	Red skin with red flesh all the way to the pit. Self-fruitful. Pollenizer for pluerry. Holds on tree well: early July to early September!
	Casselman Plum	Red skin with yellow-to-red flesh. Natural variation of Santa Rosa. Self-fruitful. Late June.
	Elephant Heart Plum	Very large, gourmet quality fruit. Red flesh, freestone. Aug - Sept ripening. Pollenizer required: Santa Rosa is good.
	Green Gage Plum	Greenish-yellow fruit, very sweet and juicy. Self-fruitful. July.
	Santa Rosa Plum	Purplish tart skin, yellow-to-red sweet flesh. Very popular and productive. Self-fruitful and good pollenizer for other plums, pluots. Mid-June.
	Satsuma Plum	Red plum, firm dark red juicy flesh, rich flavor. Excellent. Needs pollenizer.
Plums, prune	Italian Plum (Prune)	Large fruit with dark purple skin. A commercial prune variety with excellent sweet flavor. Self-fruitful. August - mid-September.
Pluots	Dapple Dandy Pluot	Taste test winner! Mottled red and yellowish fruit with tangy sweet plum-apricot flavor. Outstanding! Pollenize with Flavor Supreme, or Santa Rosa plum. August.
	Flavor King Pluot	Taste test winner! Red-purple fruit, red flesh. Small tree. Very sweet. Pollenize with Flavor Supreme, or Santa Rosa plum. Mid-August.
	Flavor Supreme Pluot	Taste test winner; one of the best summer fruits. Greenish fruit with red flesh. Sweet, rich, tangy, early. outstanding! Pollenize with Santa Rosa plum or any other pluot. June.
Pomegranates	Early Wonderful Pomegranate	Earlier-ripening variant of the standard large red-fruited variety. Showy orange-red flowers in May - June, high-quality fruit ripens in October.
	Granada Pomegranate	Natural variation of Wonderful. Deeper red blossoms, ripens a month earlier, a bit less tart. October.
	Wonderful Pomegranate	The standard large red-fruited variety. Showy orange-red flowers in May - June, high-quality fruit ripens in November.
Quince	Pineapple Quince	Large. Smooth, golden yellow skin. White flesh with slight pineapple flavor. Good for cooking, pie fillings, candies and jelly; even fresh eating? Heavy producer. Originated with Luther Burbank in 1899. [LEC] Ripens: September.
	Smyrna Quince	Huge quantities of lemon yellow fruit with rich perfume and wonderful flavor, used in cooking and preserves. September - November.
Almonds	Nonpareil Almond	Major local commercial crop. Very early bloom--late Feb. - early March. Requires pollenizer.
Pecans	Western Schley Pecan	Self-fruitful pecan, good for home gardeners.
Walnuts	Franquette Walnut	Med-large, elongated nuts with thin shell. Last to bloom and leaf out. Very large tree with extra-sweet kernels. Late October.
	Robert Livermore Walnut	This hybrid between English walnut and a Chinese species produces high-quality nuts with red kernels!
Lilac	Lavender Lady Lilac	True lilac colored flowers in huge clusters. Descanso hybrid (low chilling requirement), yet very fragrant. One of the best.
	Ludwig Spaeth Lilac	Wine purplish-red fragrant flowers in huge clusters. French hybrid.
	Persian laceleaf Lilac	Syringa x persica laciniata. Open, informal shrub to 5 to 8 feet tall and wide. Arching branches, lacy leaves. Fragrant blooms all along the branch.
Cherries, flowering	Akebono flowering cherry	Beautiful flowering cherry with a spreading and slightly weeping habit. Billows of soft pink, double flowers. Give it room to spread--about 15 feet across. Paint the trunk with interior white latex paint when young to prevent sunburn. Needs excellent drainage.

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Cherries, weeping flowering	Snow Fountains dwarf Weeping Cherry	Beautiful dwarf flowering cherry with a naturally cascading habit: a fountain of single white flowers. Orange & gold fall color. 8 - 10 feet tall, 6 spread.
	Subhirtella Weeping Cherry	Very graceful weeping flowering cherry with pale pink flowers in great profusion.
Desert Willow	Burgundy Desert willow	Darker flowers than the species. Very drought tolerant tree has an open, graceful habit. Blooms all summer. Hummingbirds love them.
Maple, Shantung	Purpleblow maple	Good substitute for Japanese maple! Small tree with attractive, shiny leaves, spreading round to planar growth habit. Tolerant of heat, sun, wind.
Maples, hybrid	Autumn Blaze hybrid Maple	The fastest growing hybrid maple, 5 feet +/-year, to 50 x 40 . Upright habit when young, then a broad oval. Bright orange-red fall color.
	Autumn Fantasy hybrid Maple	Fast-growing tree (3 - 5 feet /year) to 50 with 40 spread. Leaves in fall are bright red, with pink undersides--very strong, reliable fall color.
Oak	Burr or Mossycup oak	Huge oak, but slow growing when young (1 foot a year). Large leaves are lustrous dark green. Enormous acorns set in a showy, fringed cup. Eastern native with low-tannin acorns.
Plane trees & sycamores	Columbia hybrid Sycamore	Very fast growing shade tree. Resistant (not immune!) to anthracnose blight and mildew. Nice dappled shade, usually deep rooted. One of the few very fast trees without significant drawbacks.
	Roberts California Sycamore	Very fast growing shade tree. Resistant (not immune!) to anthracnose blight. Leaves are big and bold. California native.
Plum, flowering	Blireiana Flowering plum	Plum with red leaves in spring, turning dark green in summer. Very little or no fruit. Earliest tree to bloom in spring, with pale pink flowers in February. Grows 3 - 4 feet a year to about 25 feet , easily kept at 15. Upright when young, eventually spreading.
Plum, Redleaf flowering	Krauter Vesuvius Flowering plum	Plum with red leaves that stay burgundy through the summer. Usually very light fruit production. Grows 2 - 3 feet a year to about 15 with equal spread.
	Purple Pony Flowering plum	Naturally dwarf red-leaf plum to 10 - 12 feet; easily kept lower. White flowers make a strong contrast against dark red new growth. Very little or no fruit. Excellent small tree for garden or patio.
Redbuds	Don Egolf hybrid Chinese Redbud	New hybrid from US National Arboretum. Vivid rosy mauve flowers, no seed pods. Slow growing, compact habit. Large shrub or small tree. Good disease resistance.
	Oklahoma Redbud	Hybrid Oklahoma is more tolerant of garden watering than C. occidentalis, more heat-tolerant than C. canadensis. One of the best redbuds for garden or landscape. Shiny leaves, upright habit. Excellent large shrub or small tree.
	Western Redbud	Beautiful magenta flowers in March. Grey-green foliage. Grow as large shrub or small multi-trunked tree. Nice plantings in the UC Davis Arboretum. Very drought-tolerant. Prone to rot if over-watered in summer. Supply limited.
Wisteria	Cooke's Purple Wisteria	aka Cooke's Special. Very fast-growing, large vine with fragrant purple flowers which open all at once in early spring. This variety often has a few blooms in summer as well. Blooms best when irrigated infrequently. Prune hard just after bloom. Will bloom in part shade.
	Cooke's Purple Wisteria (Tree form)	aka Cooke's Special. Vine has been trained to a single leader so you can stake it as a small tree . Also a handy way to get a single trunk going up onto an arbor.
	White Silky Wisteria (venusta alba)	Very fast-growing vines with extra fragrant, pure white flowers. Blooms best when irrigated infrequently.
Rhubarb	Rhubarb, Victoria Cherry	Seedling grown strain, green stalks with some red. Color varies. Vigorous, productive; can often be harvested first year.
Artichoke, Globe	Artichoke, Improved Green Globe	F-1 hybrid with reduced spines, large round heads, consistent quality and high production.
Asparagus	Asparagus, U.C. 157	F-1 hybrid from UC Riverside introduced in 1978. Selected for disease resistance, tighter head (holds the head during higher temps), all-green color, low female percentage, and high production.
